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THE ECONOMY, THE DEFICIT, AND THE PRESIDENT
 July 24-28, 2009

The economy remains the top concern for Americans, but as the stock market climbed above 9,000, Americans' economic hopes have crept up a bit too. More now say the economy is getting better than said so just two weeks ago, though the public's views of the economy have fluctuated in recent months in response to varying economic news. Few say the stimulus package has improved the economy or created jobs so far -- but many think it will in the long run.

Americans, however, are opposed to a second stimulus package. The public thinks there should be more focus on the budget deficit, and President Barack Obama receives lower ratings on his handling of the deficit compared to foreign policy, the economy, and health care.

STATE OF THE ECONOMY

While most Americans think that the current recession will last at least another two years, there are glimmers of optimism. Even though more than eight in 10 still think the economy is in bad shape, the number who say the economy is very bad has dropped 9 points - down to 35% from 44% two weeks ago, when it reached a high point following worse than expected unemployment figures. The percentage that now says the economy is very bad is similar to what it was in May and June.

And more Americans now think the economy is getting better (32%) than did so just two weeks ago (21%). Fewer now say it is getting worse. Views on this measure have also varied in recent months.

The economy remains the most important problem facing the country today, volunteered by 56% of Americans. While only 12% of Americans name health care as the country's most important problem, the number citing it is growing. Back in April, health care was volunteered by only 3% of Americans.

PERSONAL ECONOMIC CONCERNS

Concern about job loss has also fluctuated. Although six in 10 Americans are at least somewhat concerned about losing their jobs, this number has dropped seven points since earlier in the month.

Still, few Americans are optimistic about the direction in which their own family's financial situation is heading overall. Only 8% say their own family's finances are getting better. More than four times as many, 35%, say they are getting worse. Most say their family's financial situation is holding steady.

ASSESSING THE STIMULUS PACKAGE

Americans have yet to see the effects of the nearly \$800 billion economic stimulus package passed by Congress and signed by the President earlier this year. Just a quarter of Americans think the stimulus package has made the national economy better so far, and even fewer think it has improved the economy in their local community.

But far more - four in 10 - think the stimulus package will help the economy overall and in their communities in the long run.

Most Americans (53%) are optimistic that the stimulus package will create a substantial number of new jobs; very few (4%) think it has done so already. But four in 10 think the stimulus package will never create a substantial number of new jobs.

A second stimulus package has been suggested by those who do not think the first stimulus package went far enough. Most Americans (65%) oppose the idea.

THE PRESIDENT AND THE ECONOMY

The President receives little of the blame for poor economic conditions, and also receives credit for making good economic decisions.

Americans don't blame the Obama Administration for the current state of the economy. Nearly equal numbers put most blame on George W. Bush's Administration (30%) or Wall Street (29%). Another 12% hold Congress accountable. Only 4% blame the Obama Administration.

And Americans trust the Obama Administration more than Republicans in Congress to make future economic decisions. 56% think President Obama is more likely to make the right decisions about the economy, compared to only 25% who say the Republicans in Congress will.

Not surprisingly, whom Americans favor generally coincides with their own party affiliation: Democrats (82%) overwhelmingly favor Obama to make the right decisions, while most Republicans (56%) favor members of their own party in Congress. 51% of independents trust Mr. Obama more.

THE PRESIDENT'S APPROVAL RATINGS

President Obama's overall approval rating stands at 58% in this poll - about what it was two weeks ago, but still down five points from June. He receives the approval of more than eight in 10 Democrats, but just a quarter of Republicans. 52% of independents approve.

The president's personal favorability has dropped slightly since he marked his first 100 days in office from 54% to 50%. He still enjoys a net positive rating, but his unfavorable number has increased five points to 23%.

More than half of Americans approve of Mr. Obama's handling of foreign policy and the economy, the public's top concern -- and economic approval has risen slightly in the last two weeks along with the slight increase in economic optimism. However, fewer than half support his handling of health care and the federal budget deficit. The President receives his lowest approval rating on the deficit.

Mr. Obama's handling of the federal budget deficit is the only area polled where more Americans disapprove than approve (43% disapprove; 40% approve). 60% of Democrats approve of the president's handling of this issue, but that is much lower than the percentage that approves of his overall performance (86%). Both independents and Republicans disapprove.

REDUCING THE DEFICIT

Americans have historically been concerned about budget deficits, and they continue to be in this poll. More are in favor - in general - of reducing the budget deficit than spending more money to stimulate the economy. When asked to choose between the two, 58% think the federal government should focus on reducing the deficit, while only 35% think it should spend more to stimulate the economy.

There are partisan differences on this matter. Republicans and independents support focusing on deficit reduction, while nearly half of Democrats favor spending more to stimulate the economy.

But while they support the principle of reducing the budget deficit, many are not willing to have the government provide fewer services in areas such as health care, education, and defense spending to do that, nor are they willing to pay more in taxes to meet that goal.

VIEWS OF THE PRESIDENT

Some have criticized Mr. Obama for trying to do too much too soon, and while 48% of Americans agree with that sentiment, almost as many (45%) think the president is trying to accomplish the right amount. These opinions are similar to what they were earlier this month, but a change from April, when a majority thought Mr. Obama was trying to accomplish the right amount.

However, more than six months into his presidency, a solid majority of Americans continues to say Mr. Obama shares their priorities for the country. Democrats and independents view the president as sharing their priorities, while Republicans do not.

THE WAR FRONT

Americans view how the wars are going in Iraq and Afghanistan differently. A majority (56%) continues to say things are going at least somewhat well for the United States in Iraq, just about the same percentage that held that view two weeks ago.

But assessments of the war in Afghanistan remain negative, with nearly six in 10 saying things are going somewhat badly or very badly.

THE POLICE AND RACE

Some Americans believe minorities and whites are treated differently by most police.

38% of Americans say most police generally treat blacks and Hispanics worse than whites; just 3% think they are treated better. But more people - just about half -- say all groups are treated the same by most police.

The percentage that says minorities are treated worse by most police increases among blacks and non-white Hispanics. It should be noted that the sample size for African Americans and non-white Hispanics is relatively small and subject to greater sampling error.

Only one in five Americans report a specific instance of being discriminated against by the police because of their race or ethnicity. But that number rises to 52% among African Americans and non-white Hispanics. Fewer than one in ten whites report such an instance.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 1050 adults nationwide, interviewed by telephone July 24-28, 2009. Phone numbers were dialed from random digit dial samples of both standard land-line and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points. The error for subgroups is higher.
