

**2008 PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION CAPTURES THE ATTENTION  
OF PENNSYLVANIA COLLEGE STUDENTS  
April 3 - 14, 2008**

With the Pennsylvania primary just days away, students attending four year colleges and universities in Pennsylvania are paying close attention to the presidential campaign, are enthusiastic about voting, and have an overwhelming favorite for Tuesday's primary - Barack Obama. They also credit John McCain as having the experience a president needs, and think he would be an effective commander in chief. The level of enthusiasm and interest exists for freshmen and seniors, for men and women, and across large and small, public and private institutions in the state.

CBS News and UWIRE, a news service powered by student journalists at more than 800 colleges, polled students in a random sample of 14 Pennsylvania four-year colleges to investigate and understand the political views of these young voters, most of whom are participating in a presidential election for their first time.

For this poll of students, CBS News and UWIRE enlisted the assistance of Cornell University's Survey Research Institute, which programmed and hosted the questionnaire on the web. In coordination with student-run newspapers, including the Daily Pennsylvanian (University of Pennsylvania), The Daily Collegian (Penn State), The Tartan (Carnegie Mellon), and The Triangle (Drexel), participating colleges and universities emailed invitations to participate to random samples of their students.

**ATTENTION AND ENTHUSIASM**

Nearly nine in 10 students attending four-year colleges and universities in Pennsylvania who are registered to vote in any state are paying attention to the 2008 presidential campaign, including 42% who are paying a lot of attention. Compared to voters of all ages nationwide, fewer of these students are paying a lot of attention.

Republicans and Democrats are both paying about the same amount of attention to the campaign, but men are more likely to be paying a lot of attention than women.

Nearly nine in ten registered voters attending four-year colleges in Pennsylvania say they are enthusiastic about voting in the 2008 election - including more than half who say they are very enthusiastic.

These students are by no means alienated from the political system. They believe the presidential election is important and that their votes matter. Only 23% agree - even somewhat - that things will be the same no matter who is elected president, and only 16% believe their individual vote doesn't matter.

**THE DEMOCRATIC VOTE**

These students are strong supporters of Barack Obama.

The poll included interviews with students who will vote or have voted in a Democratic primary in any state, as well as those likely to vote in Tuesday's primary in Pennsylvania. Most student Democratic primary voters support Barack Obama. Support for Obama is consistent across all types and sizes of schools.

Three out of four of those voting on Tuesday say they will vote in the Democratic primary. Among those Pennsylvania voters, support for the candidates is nearly identical; 71% say they will vote for Barack Obama, and 29% will vote for Hillary Clinton.

Although majorities of both men and women say they will vote for Obama, Clinton's support among women is higher than it is among men.

The number of African American students in the survey was small, but nearly all say they will vote for Obama. Although Obama leads among white students, Clinton receives a bit more support from them: 31% say they will vote for her, and 69% will vote for Obama. There are no differences by age or year in school.

By a large margin, students overall expect Obama to win the Democratic nomination. Students who will vote in the Pennsylvania primary also expect Obama to clinch the nomination, by a similar margin.

**ENGAGEMENT WITH THE CANDIDATES**

These students who say they will vote for, or have voted for, Barack Obama are especially enthusiastic: 61% say they like him a great deal better than any other Democratic candidate. Among Clinton's voters, just 42% like her a great deal better.

Many of those Obama voters will be unhappy if their candidate does not win the nomination. Two thirds of Obama's voters say they will be dissatisfied if Clinton is the nominee, including 30% who will be very dissatisfied.

And while many of Clinton's voters would likewise be dissatisfied if Obama becomes the nominee, fewer - 41% -- express that view.

**CANDIDATE QUALITIES**

Obama's support rests on strong perceptions that he cares about college voters and as president could unite the country.

The Republican John McCain, meanwhile, is seen as the candidate with the experience, and most likely to be an effective Commander-in-Chief.

Nearly half of these younger, college voters think Obama cares a lot about them, more than double the number who say Hillary Clinton cares a lot. John McCain, meanwhile, rates a scant 10% when it comes to caring a lot.

In the eyes of Pennsylvania's college students, Barack Obama stands out from the other candidates as a uniter.

Student voters overwhelmingly (75%) think Obama could unite the country; two-thirds say Clinton and McCain could not.

Among just those Pennsylvania students voting in the Democratic primary next week, these perceptions are much the same.

All three candidates are seen by a majority as having the necessary experience to be a good President - especially McCain, with 72% saying he does, more so than Obama or Clinton.

McCain is also most often seen as very likely to be an effective Commander-in-Chief. He leads Obama on this measure, while Hillary Clinton trails both McCain and Obama. Among these young voters, Clinton is the candidate most seen as unlikely to be effective in that role.

As it is for Americans nationwide, the economy is the top issue that registered Pennsylvania college students want to hear about - twice as many pick it as pick the war in Iraq.

Nationally, voters also choose the economy and jobs as the issue they most want the candidates to discuss. It eclipses the war in Iraq by a similar margin.

Barack Obama is seen as having the best plan to deal with almost all the top issues, as one might expect for someone with such a big lead overall. Students who care most about the economy, Iraq, environment, health care and education all cite Obama as having the best plan to tackle it. Only those who name immigration as their top concern pick McCain as having the best plan for it.

**LOOKING AHEAD TO NOVEMBER**

In a race between the Republican nominee John McCain and Barack Obama next November, students in Pennsylvania overwhelmingly support Obama -

- by a 42 point margin. While Hillary Clinton also beats McCain, she does so by a smaller margin (just 16 points) than does Obama.

The increase in support for McCain if Clinton is the Democratic nominee is largely the result of male students switching their support. Among male students, 67% support Obama and 33% would support McCain. But in a Clinton-McCain race in November, far more men would choose the Republican candidate: 50% of men would vote for Clinton, and 50% for McCain. Clinton leads McCain by two to one among women.

College students in Pennsylvania are getting their political information online - eight in 10 have visited websites about politics, and nearly seven in 10 have visited a candidate's web page. Fewer have visited a candidate's Facebook or My Space page.

23% of college students in Pennsylvania report attending a campaign event during this presidential campaign, and 16% have seen at least one of the candidates in person.

**REGISTRATION AND VOTING**

More than 9 in 10 students attending four-year colleges in Pennsylvania who are 18 or older say they are registered to vote, with 79% registered in the state of Pennsylvania and another 13% registered out of state. Only 8% of college students in Pennsylvania say they are not registered to vote.

24% of students registered to vote in Pennsylvania are registered to vote where they go to school, while 76% of students are registered at their home address.

51% of Pennsylvania voters who are not registered where they go to school plan to go home to vote, while another 30% plan to vote absentee. 19% haven't decided.

Nearly all of the students planning to vote in the Pennsylvania primary know where they need to go to vote - only 13% are not sure.

Still, college students in Pennsylvania indicate that steps could be taken to make them more likely to vote. Seven in 10 say that electronic voting would make them even more likely to vote, while six in 10 would be more likely to vote if they could register to vote on Election Day. Fewer than half would be more likely to vote if they had the option to vote by mail.

**RACISM VS. SEXISM**

By nearly four to one, college students in Pennsylvania say racism is a bigger problem than sexism in this country. A third thinks both are equally serious problems. These results are similar to those expressed by adults nationwide in a CBS News Poll conducted in March.

**IS AMERICA READY FOR A WOMAN, A BLACK PRESIDENT?**

Most Pennsylvania college students who are registered to vote think the U.S. is ready for either a woman president or a black president. 80% think the country is ready for a black president, while 71% think the U.S. is ready for a woman to lead the country.

Voters nationwide are less likely than their younger counterparts in Pennsylvania to say the country is ready for a woman or an African American to be commander-in-chief. Still, a majority of them say the country is ready for either.

Among Pennsylvania college students, men (71%) and women voters (72%) are equally as likely to say the country is ready for a woman president, but white voters (81%) are slightly more likely than blacks (73%) to say the country is ready for a black president.

Young voters attending Pennsylvania colleges see gender - not race -- as the bigger problem when it comes to presidential politics today. 61% say a woman candidate faces more obstacles, while 39% say a black candidate does.

Black students, however, think a black presidential candidate faces more obstacles than a woman candidate.

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Methodology:

The CBS News/UWire Poll of Pennsylvania college students was conducted with 2,366 undergraduates in 14 four-year colleges and universities in the state. The margin of error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus two percentage points. The error for subgroups is higher.

The schools were selected based on their size, their public-private status and their competitiveness to represent all four-year colleges in the state. Within each school, email invitations to participate were sent to a random sample of undergraduates (in smaller schools all students were sent invitations).

The sampled schools were: Slippery Rock University, Allegheny College, Bloomsburg University, Edinboro University, Penn State University, Penn State Berks, University of Pennsylvania, Chatham University, Carnegie Mellon University, Ursinus College, Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Robert Morris University, Drexel University, and Temple University.

The overall response rate was 12.9% after up to two reminders in the course of 7-10 days. Since the schools handled the internal mailings individually, field period and number of reminders varied. We were not able to ascertain whether some email addresses were no longer valid. The response rate varied between 24.6% (Allegheny College) and 6.3% (Bloomsburg University).

Cornell University's Survey Research Institute programmed and hosted the questionnaire on the web.

The total weighted number of respondents from each school is proportional to the number of undergraduates represented by that school in the sampling process. Within each school, the weighted results reflect the academic class, gender and race of each school's undergraduate population.
