

THE UNITED STATES HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

“Tough but doable” was the way Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee Executive Director Howard Wolfson described the Democrats' chances of taking back the House of Representative last Friday. Wolfson had a rough week. Charlie Cook, the respected non-partisan political analyst who is listened to by political reporters, and maybe more importantly, by political PACs, wrote that the math just didn't seem to be there for the Democrats to pick up the net of six seats they'd need to regain control of the House.

During the spring and summer, Cook believed that the Democrats could overcome "the math" with their strength on domestic issues. But, despite a slight edge (48% Democrat-46% Republican) in the “generic ballot question” (“If the election were held today for Congress, for whom would you vote?”) Democrats haven't put the issues together in a way to produce the tide it would take to move enough races to produce a Democratic House. Last summer, not only Cook, but top Democrats believed that the Enron, WorldCom and Arthur Anderson scandals, along with the plummeting stock market, had created a climate that could sweep the Democrats back. At one point they even fantasized that all 40 or so competitive races could break their way.

But, by August, guns had replaced butter as the overarching national political theme, and the Democrats lost that “mo.” A driving force behind the vote on the Iraq resolution was burning desire by the Democratic leadership to get the focus back on the economy. Indeed, the day after the vote, House Democratic Leader Dick Gephardt and Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle held a high profile economic forum as a signal that the economy was the main concern of Democrats.

Getting the focus on the economy is not actually a silver bullet for the Democrats. While polls show that voters are concerned about the economy and believe that the Democrats are slightly better on this issue, it's not an overwhelming vote of support. The strongest argument that the Democrats can make is that they can provide a check on the Bush administration policies, and this week, a Democratic issue group, Mainstreet USA, is launching a national TV ad campaign with that message. Republican pollster Matthew Dowd says despite that the fact that the public believes the economy is going in the wrong direction, they are looking for positive solutions, not fixing blame on President Bush or the Republicans.

The “math” that Cook refers to basically stems from the tiny number of races that are actually in play this year - mainly because of redistricting - which overwhelmingly favored incumbents. Cook Report Congressional analyst Amy Walters, points out that at a similar point 10 years ago, in October 1992, the Cook Report listed 151 of the 435 House seats as competitive. This year that number is in the mid-40s. In 1992, the post-office scandals and retirements also came into play in making more of the races competitive, but redistricting was a major factor

“The power of incumbency is a well-established fact of political life,” says Congressional analyst Rhodes Cook, “but incumbent protection became the dominant theme of this round of congressional redistricting assisted by ever more sophisticated computer programs that can track demographic changes block by block.”

Looking at the contest this way, the Democratic hurdle becomes clear. Of the 44 races CBS News and analyst Mark Gersh believe are actively in play, there are 16 districts leaning Democratic, 13 are toss-ups and 15 leaning Republican. There are 186 seats that are strong or likely for Democrats. So to reach the magic number of 218, for a majority, the Democrats would have to win ALL the 16 contests, which are now leaning Democratic, ALL the 13 toss-ups and 3 of the 15 races now leaning toward the Republicans. The Republican math is a lot easier. All they have to do, with 205 solid or likely GOP districts, is to carry 13 of the 15 districts, which are now leaning their way.

That’s presuming no big counter-trend occurs in the next two weeks. Stuart Rothenberg, another top non-partisan Congressional analyst, said on October 14 he “wasn’t yet prepared to say that the economy and poor performance of the stock market can’t combine to deliver a blow to the Republicans on November 5.” Another round of plummeting stocks, other bad economic news combined with a targeted Democratic message to use the elections as a check on Republican economic policies could “change the current political equation,” Rothenberg wrote in the Capitol Hill newspaper, Roll Call.

So, going into the final two weeks, Mr. Wolfson’s “tough but doable” is starting to look more tough than doable.

Following is the analysis of the 435 House districts. We’ve also included lists of the outgoing incumbents who are leaving the Congress, the open seats and the new ones created by redistricting and the women, blacks and Hispanics running this year.

**ELECTIONS AND PARTISAN CONTROL OF
THE U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, 1946 TO 2002**

Until the 1994 elections, the Democrats had been in control of the House since 1955. Since World War II, the Republicans have had control of the House for 10 years: 1947-1949, 1953-1955, and 1994-2000. In order for the Democrats to regain control of the House, a net gain of 6 seats is needed.

SPECIAL ELECTIONS TO THE HOUSE

There were 9 Special Elections held in the 107th Congress to fill vacancies of 4 members who resigned and 5 members who died.

RESIGNATIONS:

- AR-03 Asa Hutchinson (R) resigned on August 6, 2001, after being appointed to head the Drug Enforcement Administration. A special election was held on November 20, 2001, and John Boozman (R) was elected on November 29, 2001 to succeed him.
- FL-01 Joe Scarborough (R) resigned on September 5, 2001. A special election was held on October 16, 2001, and Jeff Miller (R) was elected on October 23, 2001 to succeed him.
- PA-09 Bud Shuster (R) resigned February 2, 2001. A special election was held on May 15, 2001, and his son, William Shuster (R), was elected on May 17, 2001 to succeed him.
- OK-01 Steve Largent (R) left office on February 15, 2002 in order to run for governor. A special election was held on January 8, 2002, and John Sullivan (R) was elected on February 27, 2002 to succeed him.

DEATHS:

- CA-32 Julian Dixon (D) died on December 8, 2000. A special election was held on June 5, 2001, and on June 7, 2001 Diane Watson (D) was elected to succeed him.
- HI-02 Patsy Mink (D) died September 28, 2002, but her name will remain on the general election ballot. A special election will be held on November 30, 2002 to elect a candidate to serve the remainder of her term, and should Mink win the general election against Bob McDermott, another special election will be held in early January to replace her.

Thus far, the ads in this district have been tame, with each party running biographical spots on their candidates. Turnham, who heads the Alabama League of Environmental Voters, describes himself as pro-gun, pro-life, and pro-God--a rare description for a Democrat. Job loss has been a campaign issue in this district, which has seen the loss of many textile mills. Turnham hopes he can use the faltering economy to his advantage, and portray his rival as being in step with the GOP's message on free trade. Nonetheless, Rogers has the advantage of being better funded than his opponent, and this race narrowly favors the Republican.

The 1st District race between Democratic businessman George Cordova and Republican insurance executive Rick Renzi in one of the state's two newly created districts is highly competitive. The district is unique in that it covers at least half the state and, instead of having a major population center, has many medium-sized cities. Bush would've taken the new district by 11,000 votes, yet registered Democrats outnumber Republicans 44 percent to 36 percent. Recent FEC filings through Sept. 30, show Renzi having out-raised his opponent \$350,690 to Cordova's \$131,825. Pres. Bush campaigned in Pheonix for Renzi on Sept. 27, where he raised around \$200,000 for the candidate. Cordova, a Hispanic, appears to be widely popular among Democrats after winning the eight-way primary against Steve Udall, whose conservative reputation and base in rural Arizona, made him the party favorite. His strong ties to the Native American community are what many say was the key to his victory, in this district where 34 percent of the voting age population is made up of minorities, and 19 percent of that group is Native Americans. Rick Renzi has poured at least \$600,000 of his own money into his campaign, whereas Cordova has lent his campaign around \$200,000. About \$500,000 of Renzi's donation went towards securing his primary nomination, during which the candidate ran at least five TV spots. A University of Northern Arizona poll from Sept. 12 through 14 showed the race at a dead tie, but a separate

poll released by the Cordova campaign showed their own candidate behind, 32 percent to Renzi's 37 percent. Cordova's campaign, however, pointed to third party candidate, Edwin Porr, as a possible source that would drain votes from his Republican rival. Republican rival. 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This new district in the Denver suburbs was created when Colorado picked up a seat in redistricting. Democrat and former state Senate Minority Leader Mike Feeley is running against banker and former state Republican Party Chairman, Bob Beauprez. Party registration is dead even with both parties at 33%, and Al Gore won this district by fewer than 2,000 votes in 2000. Pres. Bush campaigned in Denver on Sept. 27, raising approximately \$600,000 for Beauprez. The most recent FEC filings show Beauprez having raised \$1,013,310 to Feeley's \$691,418, with the Republican having already loaned his own coffers \$250,000. Recent polls for both parties show the Republican leading his opponent by roughly eight points, but the Democrats say the reason for this lead is that Beauprez spent more money than his opponent on TV and radio ads during the state's primary. Both parties have run ads in the weeks leading up to the general elections, praising their candidates for coming out against the privatization of Social Security. Due to Colorado's early voting, which began October 7, coupled with the fact that the GOP has consistently spent more on TV ads throughout the campaign, Beauprez may have the upper hand here, based on higher name recognition. Nonetheless, Feeley fits in well in this suburban district full of blue-collar workers, as he continues to campaign around his support for "working families," while trying to paint Beauprez as a "banker-developer" connected with corporate scandal. Meanwhile, Beauprez claims his past as a banker has provided him with valuable experience in the private sector, which his opponent, a career politician and lawyer, does not have. This race could go either way.

This member vs. member race is highly competitive because GOP Rep. Nancy Johnson and Democratic Rep. Jim Maloney bring roughly half their current constituents into this new district. Both veterans have worked hard to hold onto swing voters and are campaigning as moderates. Maloney has had a tough time distinguishing himself from his GOP rival on issues such as prescription drugs and privatization of Social Security, having voted in favor of the Republican-sponsored prescription drug bill. Maloney hoped to use the corporate accountability issue to his advantage, when the local hardware manufacturer, Stanley Works, threatened to reincorporate to Bermuda in order to reduce taxes. When the company decided to stay in New Britain in August, the Democrat saw his issue lose momentum. The AFL-CIO has attacked Johnson in more than one ad for supporting fast-track legislation, and rewarding Enron with tax rebates. Although Gore would have won this western Connecticut district in 2000 by 52 percent, Johnson's backers note that the new region has fewer registered Democrats than her former 6th district. Nonetheless, the nature of this seat, with 13,000 more Democrats than Republicans, favors Democrats and may be cause for Johnson to worry. Despite the fact that ex-Pres. Clinton campaigned here for Maloney on Sept. 9, Johnson has maintained a significant fundraising lead. On April 9, Pres. Bush attended a fundraising lunch for Johnson and the Republican Party that took in over \$1 million, and by the end of June the candidate had almost \$1.7 million more cash in the bank than her opponent. A poll conducted in September by the University of Connecticut showed Johnson leading Maloney, 43 percent to 36 percent.

Redistricting by the Republican controlled legislature drastically altered the 5th district, which used to favor Democrats but now shows registered Republicans outnumbering registered Democrats, 42 percent to 41 percent. Five-term incumbent Democrat Karen Thurman has had no trouble winning here in the past, but now finds herself in a seat where nearly half the voters are new to her, making her vulnerable against Republican challenger and state Sen. Ginny Brown-Waite. While Gore won the old district 50 percent to Bush's 46 percent, Bush would win the new seat, 53 percent to Gore's 45 percent. A recent GOP poll conducted for Brown-Waite in mid-Sept. showed the race at a statistical dead heat, with Thurman barely leading her challenger, 40 percent to 38 percent. This race has been no cakewalk for Brown-Waite. Many Republicans were lukewarm to the idea of her running as their nominee, citing her pro-choice stance and previous opposition to the governor's school choice legislation as reasons for withholding their support. Brown-Waite has attacked Thurman's voting record, citing her opposition to the partial-birth abortion bill, the GOP prescription drug bill and the estate and marriage penalty tax as being out of tune with what the voters' in this district want. Fundraising totals through the end of Sept., show Thurman having a steady fundraising advantage over her GOP challenger, with \$1,431,899 compared to Brown-Waite's \$648,317. However, in Sept. and Oct. several political bigshots, including Majority Whip Tom Delay, Speaker Dennis Hastert and Rep. Mark Foley, all raised money for Brown-Waite. Thurman's position on the Ways and Means Committee has given her the leverage to focus on important domestic issues, like drug coverage for seniors and protecting Social Security. Thurman has the advantage but this race could go either way.

This highly competitive open-seat race in the 2nd District is between former Democratic Congresswoman Jill Long Thompson, who served in the Agriculture Department under Clinton, and attorney and 2000 nominee Chris Chocola. Despite the fact that Bush won this district in 2000 with 54 percent of the vote, this race will be close because Thompson has gotten the upper hand in the Social Security issue. Further proof of how important Republicans view this race to be, is the fact that both Bush and Cheney have campaigned here for Chocola. The president was in South Bend on Sept. 5, where he raised over half a million dollars for GOP candidate and Indian state party. The most recent fundraising figures through the end of Sept. 2002 show Chocola having raised \$1,148,286 compared to Thompson's \$992,724. Research 2000 conducted a poll here from Sept. 24-26, for the South Bend Tribune that had Thompson leading Chocola 47 percent to 43 percent. The Democratic Party recently had to pull a TV ad that likened Chocola's business to Enron and WorldCom. The retracted ad has supplied the GOP with the ammunition they needed to paint Thompson as a negative campaigner. Though Thompson touts her farm girl values, the Indiana Farm Bureau recently endorsed her opponent. Chocola has run ads saying he helped Bush cut taxes, making him a perfect fit for this conservative district. Meanwhile, the DCCC has come out with, what Cook refers to as "one of the strangest ads in political history" lauding Thompson for opposing the 1993 Clinton budget and tax cuts. This race has seen a whole lot of finger pointing surrounding the Social Security issue. A DCCC ad quotes Chocola telling a local newspaper in 2000: "Eventually, I'd like to see the entire system privatized. It's not a 'risky scheme.'" While Republicans have fired back in an ad saying Thompson voted seven times to raid the Social Security trust fund during her tenure in the House. Thompson, however has remained ahead on the Social Security issue, which is one of the two most important issues to voters in this district, along with taxes and spending. Nevertheless, this race will be close down to the wire.

However, Carson has the advantage of having deep and diverse roots here, high name recognition and a record of bringing money into the area for local programs. This race is close but favors Carson.

The race between Bettendorf Mayor Ann Hutchinson and six-term GOP Rep. Jim Nussle is particularly interesting because Hutchinson was a registered Republican who switched parties in order to run against Nussle. This district was severely downsized during redistricting, changing its makeup from 20 counties to only 12. The district became just slightly more Democratic this time around; whereas Gore only won the old 1st District in 2000 with 51 percent of the vote, he would have won the newly drawn seat with 54 percent of the vote. The most challenging aspect of redistricting for Nussle, however, is that roughly 40 percent of this seat is new to the incumbent. President Bush attended a fundraiser for Nussle on Sept. 16 in Davenport, where he raised a quarter of a million dollars for the candidate. VP Gore campaigned in Iowa for Hutchinson in mid-October. As of the Sept. 30th filing deadline, Nussle had raised close to a million dollars, whereas Hutchinson reported having raised \$571,749. According to a Quinlan Rosner Research poll from the end of July through the end of August, the Republican was narrowly leading his opponent 49 percent to 43 percent. Republicans hope the fact that Hutchinson just recently became a registered Democrat will hurt her name recognition in this district. However, she is contrasting her impressive record during her time as mayor, when she was able to see Bettendorf through a huge budget deficit, with Nussle's current record serving as the chair of the House Budget Committee, during a time in which the country's \$237 billion surplus has slipped into a deficit. The Democrat opposes Social Security privatization, drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and the president's Trade Promotion Authority. At the end of Sept., two local TV stations pulled an NRCC ad that attacked Hutchinson's record as mayor, as well as her disregard to the increasing budget deficit. Hutchinson's spokesperson said the ad was false in asserting that the former mayor declared that the salaries of city council workers be raised 66 percent, so that she herself could get a raise claiming she gave city council members a raise at the expense of a growing budget deficit. Nussle, on the other hand, is campaigning around his commitment to Social Security and education. Iowa Democrats are expected to go to the polls in full force this November, due to several closely fought races, including those for U.S. Senate and Governor. There may be reason for Republicans to worry, but for now this seat favors Nussle.

As the first female to open a pediatric practice in Cedar Rapids, Thomas is well-known. She has been described as "affable" and is focusing her campaign on issues that hit close to home for her: prescription drug coverage, affordable health care and Medicare reimbursement rates. Meanwhile, Leach has tried to portray his rival as being too focused on the health care issue. The AMA has endorsed Leach, based on the physician's opposition to caps on non-economic damages associated with malpractice cases. In addition to the AMA, the League of Conservation Voters and the National Education Association are also backing Leach in this race. At the end of June, Thomas had out-raised Leach, \$433,000 to Leach's \$147,000 cash on hand. The incumbent is very proud of the fact that he refuses both PAC contributions and money from donors who reside anywhere outside Iowa, however President Bush tried to help him out when he campaigned for Leach on Sept. 16. The strongest things Thomas has going for her are the liberal nature of the seat, coupled with two strong candidates, Sen. Tom Harkin and Gov. Tom Vilsack, running at the top of the Democratic ticket. While Leach by no means has a secure hold on this district, voters must really be looking for change in order to elect Thomas.

This race, pitting Democratic incumbent Ronnie Shows against GOP incumbent Chip Pickering, is the toughest challenge for Democrats out of the four member versus member races this year. The new 3rd District favors Pickering in that it has only a 30 percent black voting age population, and roughly 61 percent of the residents lived in his old District. Only 38 percent of residents are from Shows' old seat. Rep. Shows has aggressively used the debacle surrounding WorldCom, which is in his current district, to highlight the need for corporate reform legislation. Shortly after the corporate debacle, Shows handed over the \$6,000 that WorldCom had donated to his campaign to a worker relief fund, and then attacked his GOP rival for not doing likewise. Shortly thereafter, Pickering managed to turn over \$5,000 that his campaign had received from executives charged in the scandal, but has yet to turn over the remaining \$77,000 he's received from the telcom giant over the years. Democrats worry that the fact that their party voted down Pickering's father's nomination to the 5th Circuit Court last March, may come back to haunt them in November, even though Shows himself supported the senior Pickering's bid. Both Pres. Bush as well as VP Cheney have campaigned for Pickering in Jackson, MS. In April, Cheney raised at least \$150,000 for the candidate, while Bush raised around \$1 million for him back in August. At the end of June, Pickering was leading Shows in fundraising with \$1.5 million cash on hand compared to Shows' \$587,000.

The race in this new district is between Democratic Clark County Commissioner Dario Herrera and Republican state Senator Jon Porter. The combination of this being an extremely marginal district, where Gore would have earned 49.2 percent back in 2000 compared to Bush's 48.7 percent, coupled with the fact that the candidates are neck and neck in fundraising, makes this an extremely competitive race. The seat favors Porter, mainly because Herrera has received so much negative press over accusations of improper dealings with the Las Vegas Housing Authority. The Democrats are fighting back, however, hoping to tie Porter to the Bush Administration's decision to use Yucca Mountain as a nuclear waste dump. A poll conducted from Sept. 18 through 19 for Porter, showed him leading Herrera, 45 percent to 36 percent, whereas a Mason Dixon poll conducted for the Democrat showed Herrera only trailing by 3 percentage points. According to the most recent FEC filings, Herrera has a slight fundraising edge with \$1,577,045 compared to Porter's \$1,518,710. Bush, who was in Vegas for Porter on Oct. 15, has campaigned twice for the Republican candidate. The Las Vegas Sun recently endorsed Herrera. This race favors Porter.

The race between GOP Rep. Felix Grucci and Long Island University, Southampton College Provost Tim Bishop, has become close. The 50-year-old Grucci is a first-term representative in this Eastern Long Island district, where Gore would have won 53 percent of the vote in 2000, compared to Bush's 43 percent. Fundraising reports through the end of Sept. show Grucci, who's raised \$1,153,619, with a strong cash advantage over Bishop, who's raised \$566,013. A poll conducted by the Democratic Cooper and Secret from July 7 through 8 showed Grucci leading Bishop, 47 percent to 26 percent. The candidates turned up the heat in this race when Rep. Grucci's campaign began running an ad accusing Bishop of "discouraging the reporting of campus rapes and falsifying school rape statistics." Bishop fought back with his own ad denying the accusations, and Southampton College filed a lawsuit in which they sought \$6 million in damages. The state Supreme Court ruled Grucci's campaign could temporarily run the ads. This race still favors Rep. Grucci, but it will go down to the wire.

Redistricting forced these two incumbents to run against each other in what is a highly competitive race. Although this is a GOP leaning district that comprises 60 percent of Gekas' old seat, and that Bush would have won in 2000 with 57 percent of vote, Holden is 27 years younger than Gekas, and has faced tough re-election battles since first elected in 1992. On the other hand, Gekas, who was first elected in 1982, has never faced a tough re-election battle. The Republican Party has pulled out all the stops to help their candidate in this race—in addition to buying over \$2.4 million in television time. Both retiring OK Rep. J.C. Watts and Rep. Dick Armey have helped Gekas raise money, while Pres. Bush and VP Cheney plan to hold fundraisers for him sometime in October. Despite all this, Gekas still trails Holden in fundraising totals. The Democrats think that Holden will win here if he succeeds in making this race about the differences between the candidates, such as Holden's support for the existing Social Security system as well as a prescription drug benefits for seniors under the current Medicare program.

This district was left open when Rep. John Thune announced his decision to run for U.S. Senate, and pits four-term GOP Gov. Bill Janklow against Democratic attorney Stephanie Herseth. This is a heavily Republican district that Bush would have won with 61 percent in 2000. A poll conducted by KELO-TV from Oct. 1 through 3, showed the race at a statistical dead heat with Herseth leading Janklow, 45 percent to 41 percent. While Janklow is favored, Herseth is an attractive and well-spoken candidate with a family history deeply rooted in state politics. She just recently moved back to South Dakota after practicing law in Washington, DC. Her grandfather was a former governor, her grandmother was formerly secretary of state here, and her father was a figure in the state Legislature. Janklow's fundraising committee, Thousands of South Dakotans for Bill Janklow, reports their candidate has raised \$869,336 to Herseth's \$1,058,508. In addition to leading her opponent in fundraising, Herseth, 31, has the advantage of being the younger, fresher face in this race compared to her 63-year-old opponent, and her campaign is counting on the fact that voters are suffering from "Janklow fatigue." This race remains a toss-up.

Gore would have narrowly won the newly redrawn Puget Sound-based district in 2000 with 48.4 percent, compared to Bush's 46.8 percent. The most recent fundraising figures show Democrat Larsen leading his GOP challenger, \$1,252,112 to Smith's \$327,249. As of mid-October, the NRCC had not responded to Smith's requests for monetary help on her campaign, prompting political analysts to speculate that the Republicans have given up hope of winning in this district. Reapportionment did very little to change Washington state's makeup, thus incumbents have remained relatively safe here, yet this is an extremely marginal district. This race favors Larsen.

Redistricting did little to change the 2nd District, where freshman GOP Rep. Shelley Moore Capito faces Democrat and 2000 nominee Jim Humphreys in the general election. Humphreys only lost to Capito by a two percent margin in 2000, and Democrats argue the incumbent is too comfortable with the GOP leadership, which may hurt her in this traditionally Democratic district.
