

FIVE YEARS AFTER THE 9/11 ATTACKS: ARE AMERICANS SAFER?
August 17-21, 2006

Are Americans safer now than before 9/11? Many believe the answer is no. More now say the threat of terrorism has grown since 9/11 than said so last year. And Americans think U.S. military actions in Iraq and Afghanistan have created more terrorists willing to attack the U.S.

54% of Americans -- slightly more than in 2002 -- feel personally safe themselves. But nearly half feel uneasy or in danger.

When asked to compare how they feel now to how they felt five years ago, 39% say they feel less safe now. Only 14% feel safer.

Saying you feel safe personally and thinking America is safe are two different things. When asked how safe they think most Americans feel generally, just 31% think Americans feel safe, while 57% say most feel uneasy and 10% think they feel in danger.

41% think the threat of terrorism against the U.S. has increased since the attacks of 9/11, up from 30% who thought that a year ago. 43% say the threat is about the same as it was five years ago, and just 14% say the threat has decreased since the attacks.

Women and people in the Northeast, where the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center occurred, are especially concerned. Only 7% of those living in the Northeast say the threat of terrorism has decreased since the attacks of 9/11.

LIFE AFTER THE ATTACKS OF SEPTEMBER 11TH, 2001

The events of 9/11 are not in the forefront of many people's minds; they were more so a year after the attacks occurred. Now, 17% say they think about those events every day, down from 34% in September 2002. 27% think about them every week. 49% now think about 9/11 once in a while.

23% say that life has not returned to the way it was before September 11, 2001, but most say it has, at least in part. 48% say daily life in America has returned somewhat to what it was before the attacks, and another 28% say it has mostly returned.

However, the 9/11 attacks continue to affect the behavior of some Americans today. A quarter say they are less likely to fly as a result of the attacks five years ago, and one in five are less likely to attend events where there are thousands of people. 24% say they still feel nervous and edgy. Women are more likely than men to admit their behavior has been affected. In fact, 31% of women say they still feel nervous or edgy, compared to just 17% of men.

Americans who have a close friend or relative who was hurt or killed in the terrorist attacks of 9/11 are not more likely to have changed their behavior patterns as a result of the attacks than are Americans as a whole, but they are more likely to think about the attacks on a daily basis. 35% of Americans who had a close friend or relative that was a victim of the attack think about 9/11 every day.

ANOTHER ATTACK

59% of Americans consider another terrorist attack in the U.S. likely, a much lower percentage than shortly after 9/11. In the weeks after the attacks, 78% said another attack against the U.S. was likely in the coming months. Just after the foiled plot to blow up airplanes leaving from London was made public early in August, 64% expected an attack.

22% are very concerned about a terrorist attack in their own area; that has remained stable in the past few years. It was as high as 32% just after the 2001 attacks. Residents of the Northeast (31%) are most concerned, while those in the Midwest are least concerned (16%).

HAVE U.S. ACTIONS AFFECTED THE TERRORIST THREAT?

Americans think some major U.S. foreign policy initiatives have made the threat of terrorism against the U.S. worse. 48% believe the war in Iraq has increased the threat of terrorism, a percentage that has grown in the past few years.

The war in Afghanistan is also viewed as increasing the terrorist threat, although to a slightly lesser extent. 35% think that war has increased the threat of terrorism, while 16% think it has decreased the threat, and 46% believe the threat has stayed the same.

Both wars are viewed as having created breeding grounds for terrorists. 54% think that the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq have created more terrorists planning to attack the U.S., while only 15% think those wars are eliminating terrorists.

There is growing doubt that the war in Iraq is even connected to the broader war on terrorism. 51% say the war is not part of the war against terrorism, while 44% say it is.

Six in ten Americans do not believe Saddam Hussein was involved personally in the attacks, while 31% believe he was. Republicans are divided on the question, while majorities of both Democrats and Independents do not think the former Iraqi dictator was involved. In September 2002, a year after the terrorist attacks, 51% believed Saddam Hussein was involved in the attacks.

Americans are more pessimistic about the war on terrorism than they have been in years: 21% think the terrorists are winning that war -- the highest number ever. 36% think the U.S. and its allies are winning, while 38% think neither side is winning the war on terrorism.

Fewer than half of Americans are confident that the U.S. government will capture or kill Osama bin Laden, who is believed to be responsible for the 9/11 attacks. 48% are confident - the lowest number to date - while 49% express little or no confidence. In October 2001, when the U.S. military began their attacks on Afghanistan, 76% of Americans were confident the U.S. would capture or kill bin Laden.

Moreover, a majority says that if Osama bin Laden is not captured or killed then the U.S. cannot win the war on terrorism.

Most Americans remain generally positive about how the war against terrorism is going overall - 60% think it is going at least somewhat well, though only 8% say that it is going very well. And the number of Americans who say the war on terror is going well has declined from 77% in September 2002, one year after the 9/11 attacks.

IS THE GOVERNMENT READY?

Americans are divided on whether the U.S. is adequately prepared to deal with a terrorist attack; 49% think the U.S. is prepared, 44% think it is not. This is a significant change since March 2003, as the war in Iraq was starting. Then, 64% thought the U.S. was prepared to deal with an attack.

In addition, fewer now think their state and local governments are prepared for an attack. 52% think they are not, while 39% think they are. In 2003, 49% thought their local governments were up to the task.

Americans are especially worried about the government's ability to confront a biological or chemical attack. 73% say the U.S. is not prepared to deal with that.

These findings underscore the perception of a majority of Americans that the government could be doing more to prevent another attack. 58% think the government has not done all it could to make the country safe from future attacks, while 40% think it has. That has not changed since a year after the attacks.

Americans are evenly divided as to whether the federal government has done enough to improve airport security since 9/11. Opinion has risen from mid-August, when the foiled plot to blow up airplanes traveling from England to the United States was in the forefront of the news. But the current numbers are similar to those of one year ago.

Still, most express confidence that the government will protect its citizens from attacks. 70% have at least some confidence (although fewer than one in five have a great deal of confidence), and 29% are not confident. Fewer had confidence immediately after Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast last year. But many more did just after the 9/11 attacks.

Americans seem resigned to living with the threat of terrorism. 81% think it is something Americans will always have to live with, while only 18% think it can someday be eliminated.

PRESIDENT BUSH AND THE CAMPAIGN AGAINST TERRORISM

Currently, 55% of Americans approve of the way the President is handling the war on terror - up four points from mid-August and the highest rating he has received in over twelve months. Still, approval of Bush's handling of terrorism has dropped considerably over the last five years - in December 2001, 90% of Americans approved.

Approval slowly declined throughout 2002, and reached the mid-50s in April 2004, where it has, for the most part, remained.

A large majority of Republicans (86%) approve of President Bush's handling of this issue, while only 32% of Democrats do. Independents are more divided - 50% approve and 39% disapprove.

A majority of Americans also believe the Bush Administration has made at least some progress - but not necessarily a lot - in both developing a comprehensive plan to protect the United States from

future terrorist attacks and in eliminating the threat posed by terrorists operating from other countries.

About half of all Americans think the policies of the Bush Administration have made the U.S. safer from terrorism, but one in 4 believes Administration policies have made the country less safe, while a similar number say they have had no effect.

One reason for skepticism may be that nearly half of Americans do not think terrorism is a problem a president can do much about. While 51% of Americans believe terrorism is something a president can do a lot about, nearly as many - 45% - think terrorism is beyond a president's control.

DO ANTI-TERROR MEASURES AFFECT CIVIL LIBERTIES?

Americans are less willing to criticize the Bush Administration for limiting civil liberties in order to fight terrorists than they were in July, before the revelation of the foiled plot to blow up airplanes. Now only one in 4 Americans believes the Administration has gone too far in limiting civil liberties, down 7 points from July. Most Americans - 53% - believe that balance is about right, and one in 5 Americans thinks the Bush Administration has not gone far enough.

However, a majority of Americans - 68% - think they will have to give up some of their personal freedoms in order to make the country safe from terrorism; fewer than half as many say they will not. This number has been consistent for the past few years, although it is down 11 points from when Americans were asked this question right after the terrorist attacks in September, 2001.

Still, 59% of Americans say they are at least somewhat concerned about losing some of their civil liberties - with one in 4 saying they are very concerned - down slightly from December, 2001. 70% of Democrats and 59% of Independents are at least somewhat concerned, while less than half of all Republicans (45%) agree.

But most Americans also believe that a President should not have the power to make changes to the rights usually guaranteed by the Constitution in order to conduct the current campaign against terrorism. 59% say a President should not have this power, while 36% disagree - down 6 points from July. These numbers mark a turnaround from December of 2001, when most Americans - 64% - said a President should have this authority.

A 62% majority of Republicans, 58% of conservatives, and 70% of Americans who approve of the way Bush is handling his job as president believe a President should have wider authority to fight terrorism.

The foiled London plot may have made Americans a little more willing to allow the government to monitor the phone calls of ordinary Americans in order to reduce the threat of terrorism. 38% now say that's acceptable, up 8 points from last May, and the highest number since right after the terrorist attacks of September 11th (45%). This number doubles to 76% when Americans are asked about monitoring the phone calls of people the government is suspicious of.

The difference in support may be because most Americans have little concern that their own telephone calls will be monitored. 70% say

they are not very or not at all concerned, 15% say they are somewhat concerned, and only 14% say they are very concerned.

There are, however, large differences in terms of race. 51% of blacks say they are at least somewhat concerned that their phone calls will be monitored, while half as many whites are. And the difference is even greater when it comes to being very concerned. 4 out of 10 blacks say they are very concerned, as opposed to only 1 out of 10 whites.

"Racial profiling" in the United States has been understood to mean police stopping blacks more than whites. Americans as a whole are divided on the issue, but a slight majority of whites think the practice is justified, while only one out of 4 blacks think so.

When asked specifically about racial and ethnic profiling at airport checkpoints (a question that is most likely understood as NOT being about profiling African-Americans but about Arabs and Arab Americans), support among blacks increases, though a majority still believes it is not justified. 52% of whites continue to support it.

Regardless of whether or not Americans agree with racial or ethnic profiling, Americans think it is likely to occur. When asked how likely they think it is that Arab Americans, Muslims, and immigrants from the Middle East are being singled out unfairly by people in this country, 83% say it is at least somewhat likely, with one out of 3 saying it is very likely. These numbers are lower than they were right after September 11th, 2001.

NEW YORK CITY

76% of Americans have a good image of New York City. While this number is a bit lower than it was in the year after the 2001 attacks, it remains higher than it was before the attacks.

In addition, 67% say that if they had the time and money they would visit New York City.

The public's view of New York City is considerably better than their view of New Orleans, now facing its one-year anniversary of the landfall of Hurricane Katrina. Only 49% of Americans say they have a good image of New Orleans, and only 45% say they would visit New Orleans as a vacation destination.

NEW YORKERS' VIEWS OF 9/11

Residents of New York City are much more concerned than other Americans about a terrorist attack in their area, and far fewer of them feel safe. More of them live with memories of the 9/11 attacks. New Yorkers are also more critical of the federal and local government's efforts to prepare for another attack.

36% of New Yorkers report feeling safe -- nearly twenty percentage points lower than among Americans as a whole. Nearly two-thirds don't feel safe: 47% feel somewhat uneasy, and 16% feel in danger.

When asked about most New Yorkers, only 19% believe most New Yorkers feel safe, 55% think they feel somewhat uneasy, and 21% think they feel in danger.

The threat of terrorism is always present in the minds of most New Yorkers. Nearly seven in 10 are personally very concerned about another terrorist attack in New York City -- more than three times as many as nationally express concern about an attack in their area.

But New Yorkers are only slightly more likely than Americans as a whole to expect another terrorist attack in the U.S. generally. 21% expect that is very likely, and another 36% expect it is somewhat likely.

New Yorkers are more negative than Americans overall about the war on terrorism. Just 23% view the U.S. as winning that war, while about the same percentage sees the terrorists as winning. 40% think neither side is winning.

Not only are New Yorkers less likely to say the U.S. is winning the war on terrorism, but they are also doubtful the government -- at any level -- has adequately prepared for another possible attack. Only 25% think the federal government has done all it could to make the U.S. safe -- a much smaller percentage than among Americans overall.

Only 35% of New Yorkers (compared to 48% of Americans as a whole) feel the federal government has done enough to improve airport security. 62% feel it has not.

Local government is also viewed as unprepared by many New Yorkers. Just 39% think New York City is prepared to deal with another attack; even more, 51%, think it is not. Only 13% believe New York City is prepared for a biological or chemical attack.

When asked whether the government in Washington is doing enough to protect New York City specifically from terrorism, 58% of New Yorkers say it is not, up from 44% in 2002.

New Yorkers are also more likely than Americans generally to have the events of 9/11 on their minds. 29% think about the attacks every day, compared to 17% of Americans overall. Another 17% think about it every week.

While most New Yorkers' lives have returned to normal following the 2001 attacks, 31% are still dealing with changes caused by the attacks, and another 2% volunteer that life will never return to normal. New Yorkers are also more likely to experience some residual anxiety as a result of the attacks. 40% report still feeling nervous and edgy, versus 24% of Americans overall.

The national poll was conducted among a nationwide random sample of 1206 adults, interviewed by telephone August 17-21, 2006. The error due to sampling could be plus or minus three percentage points for results based on the complete sample.

The New York City poll was conducted among a citywide random sample of 838 adults, interviewed by telephone August 23-27, 2006. The error due to sampling could be plus or minus three percentage points for results based on the complete sample.
