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ISSUES: MORE U.S. TROOPS TO AFGHANISTAN, THE ECONOMY AND HEALTH CARE December 4-8, 2009

Confronted with problems domestically and abroad, President Barack Obama's job approval rating has reached a new low in this poll, with just 50% approving of the job he is doing, down three points from last month. This is his lowest job approval rating yet in CBS News Polls.

In his speech to the nation last week, the President outlined his plan for the war in Afghanistan, including sending an additional 30,000 U.S. troops there; his speech had some effect. By a slim margin, more Americans now approve than disapprove of a troop increase there, and the President's approval rating on handling the war in Afghanistan has risen ten points from its low last month. However, most disapprove of setting a timetable for troop withdrawal, which the President suggested could begin in 2011.

The President's approval ratings on handling the economy is at an all-time low, and 50% disapprove of his handling of health care.

JOB APPROVAL

Confronted with problems on both the domestic and international fronts -- including unemployment, health care reform and the war in Afghanistan -- the President's job approval rating has fallen to an all-time low. Just 50% of Americans approve of the job President Obama is doing overall, while 39% disapprove. Last month, 53% approved.

He still receives strong support from Democrats, but his approval rating among Republicans is just 19%, and only 43% of independents approve.

The president's approval rating on the nation's most important issue, the economy, continues to decline. 47% approve of the job he is doing on the economy - his lowest rating to date. 43% disapprove.

On health care, President Obama elicits more negative than positive ratings, with disapproval inching up to the 50% mark, its highest level yet. 42% approve of his handling of the issue. Earlier this fall measures were more upbeat.

U.S. TROOPS IN AFGHANISTAN

51% of Americans approve of sending more troops to Afghanistan, a strategy the President outlined in his speech last week. 43% disapprove.

There is a noteworthy partisan dynamic to these views: members of the President's own party disapprove of a troop increase in Afghanistan, while two in three Republicans approve. Independents are divided.

President Obama said he would begin troop withdrawal from Afghanistan in 2011, but on this a majority disagrees with the president. 55% of the public thinks setting a deadline for troop withdrawal is a bad idea; just 41% think it is a good idea.

President Obama's partisans agree with him on this point. Democrats support a timetable for troop withdrawal, while Republicans and independents do not.

However, the public would rather have U.S. troops remain in Afghanistan for just a year or two. 57% are willing for U.S. troops to stay in Afghanistan for two years or less, but just 33% are willing for them to stay longer than that or as long as it takes.

Americans would pay for the added troops with spending cuts. Just 19% want the cost of sending more troops to Afghanistan to be added to the budget deficit, and only 10% support a tax increase.

PRESIDENT OBAMA'S WAR

President Obama's approval rating on handling Afghanistan has risen ten points in this poll, from its low of 38% last month.

The increase is attributable to a rise among Republicans and independents. 42% of Republicans now approve of how President Obama is handling Afghanistan, up from 23% last month. Among independents, approval has increased from 30% to 45% now.

But the public gives the President only mixed reviews on whether he has clearly explained his plan for Afghanistan -- 42% say he has, 47% say he has not.

By two to one, assessments of the war remain highly negative. 60% think the war is going badly, while 30% think it is going well. This is a somewhat more positive view than last month,

In November, assessments of the war had dropped sharply among Republicans. Those figures have returned to previous levels; 41% of Republicans now think the war is going well. Just 27% of Democrats agree.

49% think the U.S. is doing the right thing fighting in Afghanistan; 39% think the U.S. should not be involved in Afghanistan now.

THE WAR AND TERRORISM

In his speech, President Obama said "the days of providing a blank check are over," and that the government of Afghanistan must play a strong role in eliminating terrorists and creating stability there.

Most Americans don't see the government of Afghanistan as providing much help in efforts to create stability. Just 26% think the U.S. can count on the Afghan government to work toward stabilizing the country, while more than twice as many, 61%, think the U.S. can't count on that.

The public is divided about the long-term prospects for rooting out terrorists from the country. 48% think it is likely the U.S. will be able to stop terrorists from using Afghanistan as a safe haven for their attacks against the U.S. and its allies (but just 11% think that is very likely). 42% think that is not likely.

The President talked about the need to defeat Al Qaeda in Afghanistan; just under four in 10 think sending more troops to Afghanistan will make the U.S. safer from terrorism; far more than the 8% that think it will make the U.S. less safe. 45% think it will have no effect.

THE ECONOMY

Americans continue to volunteer the economy and jobs as the nation's top problem, far outdistancing their second most pressing issue - health care.

The public's overall assessment of the condition of the national economy remains grim; 77% of Americans say the economy is in bad shape.

In addition, just 29% of Americans think the economy is getting better, while 23% think it is getting worse. 47% say the economy is staying the same. Even though the public's outlook for the economy isn't especially hopeful, it is significantly more optimistic than earlier this year, when just 5% of Americans thought the economy was improving.

The struggling economy has an impact on how Americans view the overall direction of the country. 37% of Americans say the nation is headed in the right direction - down slightly from September. 56% think the country is off on the wrong track.

While Americans are not very optimistic, they are 25 points more positive about the direction the U.S. is headed than they were a year ago.

Still, among those who think the economy is in very bad shape (33%), eight in 10 say the country is off on the wrong track.

HEALTH CARE

As the Senate continues its debate over health care reform, the state of public opinion remains much the same as it has been: Americans support a public option, but few still believe the reforms under debate would actually help them personally.

About six in ten Americans continue to express support for the so-called "public option" -- which the Senate appears to have sidelined for now. Views on this haven't changed recently. As was the case last month, Democrats favor it and Republicans are opposed.

Last summer, in poll questions that did not include the phrase "public option," views were much the same, with six in ten consistently in favor.

But as both sides of the debate have dug in to assert their positions this fall, the public's views on the impact of reform remain steady and skeptical: few Americans think they'll personally be helped by the reforms, and more than twice as many more think they'll be hurt, while four in ten foresee no impact.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 1,031 adults nationwide, interviewed by telephone December 4-8, 2009. Phone numbers were dialed from random digit dial samples of both standard land-line and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points. The error for subgroups is higher.
