

THE 2006 MIDTERMS
September 15-19, 2006

Americans usually dislike Congress but like their own representative; that is why the re-election rate for incumbents is so high. But this year fewer than half of voters believe their own Congressional Representative deserves reelection - fewer than at any time since 1994. 42% of voters feel their Congressman deserves reelection, but 47% say it's time to give a new person a chance.

As for Congress overall, Americans continue to give it low approval ratings - just 25% approve of the job they're doing in this poll. This matches the approval rating Congress received in September 1994, two months before the Republican takeover of Congress. Just before the election that year, approval fell even more, to 20%.

For most Americans, the 2006 Congressional elections have been nationalized: they say it will be national, not local issues that will determine their vote. Fewer than half say they will not be affected by the fight for party control or by their feelings about President Bush. Democrats enjoy an advantage over Republicans in the generic Congressional ballot, but they are less apt to be seen as having a plan for the country.

Most voters - 63% - say national issues will matter to them more this year. Just 27% say their vote will be about their state's local issues. In 2002, national issues mattered more to 55% of voters. Majorities of both Republicans and Democrats say national issues will matter more this election.

Opinions about the Congress are usually low - and the 109th Congress is seen as worse than usual. 64% of Americans say that during 2005 and 2006 Congress has accomplished less than it usually does during a typical two year period.

When voters were asked to volunteer one thing Congress has done in the past year that stands out, 75% could not come up with anything. 4% name legislation in general and the same number mention immigration. These are followed by the war with Iraq with 3%.

Americans are mostly negative about where the country in general has gone in recent years - not just what has happened in Congress. When asked to compare things in the U.S. now to five years ago, 60% of Americans say things are worse today. Only 18% say things are better, while a similar number think things are about the same as they were five years ago.

Americans are divided as to whether things will be better in the next five years. 31% think things will be better five years from now, while 37% think things will get worse. One out of 4 Americans expect things to stay about the same.

When looking ahead to the future for the next generation of Americans, 30% believe life will be better, while 38% believe that life will be worse. 28% of Americans today believe that things will be about the same for future generations of Americans. This outlook is similar to what it was in October 2002.

Americans are also mostly pessimistic about government in general. 62% say people like themselves have little say in what the government does. 71% think the government does the right thing only some of the time or never.

VOTING FOR CONGRESS

If the midterm elections for the U.S. House of Representatives were held today, 50% of registered voters say they would support the Democratic candidate, while 35% would support the Republican.

Among the smaller group of registered voters who say they will DEFINITELY vote this fall, results are similar: 50% plan to vote for the Democrat, while 37% say they will vote for the Republican.

More voters say their vote will be to help put Democrats in control than say it will be to help Republicans. 34% see their vote for Congress as a vote to help put Democrats in control; another 19% think of it as helping the Republican Party stay in control. 44% say their vote will be about something else.

35% think of their vote this November as one against the President and 16% think of it as for him. Another 46% say Bush is not a factor in their vote. These numbers are similar to what they were this past July, but a reversal from the summer before the 2002 midterm elections.

Heading into previous midterm elections, voters were less likely to say presidents would be factors in their votes than they are this year. And in those earlier elections, voters who said presidents would be a factor said their vote for Congress was either a vote for the president or evenly divided.

In another change from previous years, voters now think it really matters who controls Congress. 65% disagree with the statement: "It makes no real difference which party controls congress - things go on just as they did before" - the highest number since CBS News and the New York Times started asking the question in 1998. Views are about the same among Americans overall.

If the voters' predictions are correct, there will be a real change next January: 54% of voters expect the Democrats will win more seats this fall than the Republicans. 32% say the Republicans will win more seats.

Voters are more enthusiastic about this year's elections than previous ones. 43% say they are more enthusiastic this year - higher than in 2002 and 1998.

Moreover, seven in 10 voters say they are paying at least some attention to the 2006 election campaigns, including a quarter who are paying a lot of attention.

CONGRESS, ITS MEMBERS, AND THE PARTIES

When it comes to Congress as a whole, cleaning house is the apparent message. Just 12% of voters say most members of Congress have done their job well enough to deserve reelection, while three in four believe it's time to give new people a chance. Historically, few voters have said that most members of Congress deserve reelection.

On specific characteristics, voters continue to rate their own Congressman better than the legislative body as a whole. But no one's marks are stellar.

46% of voters say their own Representative is more interested in serving the people of his district, but a sizable number - 43% - say he or she is more interested in helping special interest groups. Half say their Congressman understands their needs and problems, but 44% say he or she does not. Larger percentages of voters view most members of Congress as more interested in helping special interests, and not understanding people like them.

Americans continue to give their own Representative higher ratings than the legislative body as a whole. 53% of Americans approve of the job their Congressman is doing.

Republicans have the advantage when it comes to which party is seen as having a clear plan for the country -- 45% believe they have a clear plan, as opposed to 38% who say Democrats do. About half believes Democrats do not have a clear plan; 45% think Republicans do not have one.

Americans think Republicans and Democrats would focus first and foremost on the war in Iraq if elected in November, but beyond that, many think each party would have different priorities if they

controlled Congress after the November elections. The largest disparities are on terrorism and the economy. 18% believe fighting terrorism would be the Republicans' top priority, as opposed to just 5% who believe it would top the Democrats' priorities; 12% believe Democrats would focus on the economy, as opposed to just 6% for Republicans.

The overwhelming majority (69%) believes both Democrats and Republicans take terrorism equally seriously. But some do see a difference on this measure, and give an edge to Republicans over Democrats by 22% to 6%.

Republicans continue to hold an edge as the party seen as best able to deal with terrorism, while Democrats have a larger edge on the economy, on which they now have a 15-point lead.

Democrats continue to hold a 5-point lead over the Republicans as the party best able to make the right decisions about the war in Iraq. But Democrats have seen their advantage on Iraq dwindle from the 18-point advantage they held in May.

Despite Republican inroads on which party would be better at handling the war in Iraq and their advantage on dealing with terrorism, most people believe Democrats are more likely to tell the truth about what's happening in Iraq (by 21 points) and on terrorism (by 14 points).

52% of Americans have a favorable view of the Democratic Party, compared to 41% who view the Republicans favorably. Views of Democrats

have changed little since May. Republicans made some gains in June, but views of the GOP have slipped again this month.

ISSUES AND THE VOTE

Although few voters will base their vote solely on these issues, terrorism, the war in Iraq and immigration will still be top tier issues for voters in this election. About one in five says terrorism will be the single most important issue in their vote, and one in ten says the same about the war and immigration. Far larger majorities say those three issues will be one of the top three they consider when deciding how to vote.

Republicans are more likely than Democrats to say their vote this Fall will be influenced by a candidate's positions on terrorism and immigration, while Democrats are more likely to say the war in Iraq will matter more in their vote.

POTENTIAL 2008 PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

Views of the current presumed frontrunners for their respective parties' 2008 presidential nominations - Hillary Rodham Clinton for the Democrats and John McCain for the Republicans - are similar to what they were in May and June. On the Democratic side, 32% now view Senator Clinton favorably (the same as in June), and 36% view her unfavorably. Senator McCain receives more positive than negative views from the public, but more than five in 10 Americans continue to be undecided or have no opinion of him.
